A message from the Principal...

Welcome to 2021 at Harvester Technical College. I am pleased to report that we have had a very positive start, with students and staff alike feeling excited about the year ahead. Electrotechnology

Plumbing

It has been an excellent start to 2021 for the Certificate II Plumbing pre - app group.

They have jumped in boots and all to get both the Hand Tools unit and Power Tools unit theory completed. They are well on the way to finishing the Basic Sheet Metal theory also.

This year's class is larger than previous years, and includes many year 12 students who have already completed a certificate II course last year and have an idea of what is expected of them.

Thursday 11 of Feb was the first day for the class to officially begin their practical work in our Plumbing workshop. They made an excellent start with introducing the sheet metal tasks. Every student started off a little hesitant with using the basic plumbing hand tools and workshop equipment. Never the less they all had a successful 4 sessions and are excited to take on the next challenge placed in front of them.

This year's group will hopefully be able to attend World Plumbing Day on Thursday the 11 March 2021, at the Plumbing Industry Climate Action Centre in Brunswick.

The World Skills Victorian competition takes place simultaneously for apprentice plumbers and gasfitters. The winner goes on to represent Victoria in a National competition. This is a great opportunity for the students to see first hand what skills are required to complete the design and installation that is set out on display for all to see, they also get to understand what time management

Tech Ten Technology - Wood

Tech Ten 1 have started the year well in their Wood Technology class, initially looking at the OHS requirements for the workshop and how to safely use hand tools. They have also been examining Wood as a material and gaining a better understanding of the differences between hard and soft wood and timber as a renewable resource.

In their most recent lessons, students have moved into the workshop to start their first practical tasks and have been practicing marking and cutting timber to a high level of accuracy. This skill will be essential in the coming weeks as they move into learning different timber joins and their uses.

Successful start to 2021





Additionally, students have been working together in teams as part of PDS. An activity they were working on today used cryptic clues to solve a puzzle. The class were given 25 cards with images on them, all cryptic clues that the students then had to match. In the middle of each tile was a letter, after the puzzle was completely worked out the letters together spelled out 'Working together is success!" The students were extremely competitive and very engaged.

Numeracy Update

It's the start of the year so we all need a little reminding of how to do maths again! For that reason we have all of our students practicing the basic four operations with fractions, decimals and percentages.

Our Fast-Track students have just completed a unit on basic operations, angles and bearings and are about to start their practical problem solving assessments. They'll be testing their problem solving abilities by building a Hexayurt from a few pieces of balsa wood. Students will be required to calculate the correct angles and roof pitch to ensure that the size of each roof panel will fit correctly without any gaps. Students will also be building on their team work and communication skills to get the job done (sounds a lot like a work site!).

The rest of our students will start to delve into their Design and Measurement unit. HTC focusses heavily on this area in Numeracy as it relates directly to their trade areas. It's been a nice start to the year so we're looking forward to building and designing a great 2021 in Numeracy!

PRIVACY COLLECTION STATEMENT - Secondary Schools Information for parents and carers

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health. Such information will also be collected when required to fulfil a legal obligation, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law. If that information is not collected, the school may be unable to provide optimal education or support to your child or fulfil those legal obligations.

For example, health information may be collected through the school nurse, primary welfare officer or wellbeing staff member. If your child is referred to a specific health service at school, such as Student Support Service officer, or school-engaged psychologist, the required consent will be obtained.

Our school may use online tools, such as apps and other software, to effectively collect and manage information about your child for teaching and learning purposes, parent communication and engagement; student administration; and school management purposes. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interest of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure allowed or mandated by law.

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law.
