With many experiencing "lockdown fatigue" at the end of last year, it is both reassuring and hopeful that additional COVIDsafe measures implemented by the Department, such as free rapid antigen tests and air purifiers for schools, will give us the best possible chance at continued, safe face-to-face learning this year.

Literacy start to 2022

The Head Start Literacy class have commenced their first week of Literacy classes and already students have produced some excellent written work. Students are unpacking notions of success and effective entrepreneurial enterprises by writing a complex recount on the life of Steve Job's and the Apple empire. Well done Head Start students, what a great start!

Tech Ten students have been working on their 'Expressive Response Diary' looking at different cases of misconduct in the workplace. Year 10 Literacy students have also been developing vocabulary and knowledge of writing structures for writing expressive opinions. In coming weeks, students will be beginning their Personal Development Skills Project- 'The Amazing Race' which will see students work in teams to navigate the city in short problem-solving challenges.

In the realm of Plumbing Literacy, students have kicked off the year looking at what it means to be a plumber. They've explored the range of pathways that are available to plumbers and the high demands the industry places on successful plumbers working in the trade industry. They have also looked at hazards in the workplace, discussing their concerns about the trade and potential hazards they may encounter such as gas leaks and asbestos. The Plumbing students are demonstrating a high level of engagement in the Literacy classroom and are commended for their efforts.

Carpentry Literacy students are exploring sustainability in the building and construction industry as they prepare for a 2-day camp in Kinglake. Keep up the great work!


Kicking off Numeracy for 2022.

While the last few years have been a little bumpy (thanks to the notorious Covid-19), we are so happy to start the year in class with all our students pretty eager to just get on with it! This year we have seen a new cohort of year 10s whose last memories of maths are likely to have been trying to do algebra on their laptop. We're hoping this year is nothing like the last, and its going to be lots of face-to-face, hands on learning on the table for all of our students.

The beginning of the year at HTC is all about recapping prior knowledge. Our students have started heavy on the fractions, percentages and decimals which are fundamental to all facets of Numeracy. We're switching things up in some of the classes and covering angles first. This is also giving students the opportunity to use measuring tools correctly and improve their accuracy by using compasses and protractors. A measuring tool in Numeracy is just as important as a measuring tool in Technology so starting early will help the students in the classroom as well as the workshop.

We have a few hands on activities coming up for our year 10's with paper planes, spray paint and line markers. Our Intermediates and Seniors can look forward to designing and building 3D models of famous buildings, homes and hexayurts.

PRIVACY COLLECTION STATEMENT - Secondary Schools Information for parents and carers

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interest of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure allowed or mandated by law.

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law.
